



811 Youth Community Safety Service Award Process

Young men and women from chartered organizations such as Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, 4-H, FFA, etc... provide community service in every part of the country. Often these projects involve digging. The following process provides guidance in which to establish a relationship with a local organization and to introduce the 811 Youth Community Service Safety Award program guidelines.

1. Contact the organization. A few examples are below.

2. Setup an appropriate time to meet.

- A. Establish a means of communication such as face to face, phone call, mail, video presentation, etc.
- B. Discuss CGA Safety Community Service Award
- C. As a CGA member you want to recognize the youth organizations who take into consideration the safety aspects for calling 811 before you dig.
- D. What's required (setting up the project, calling local One Call Center, communications, etc.)
- E. CGA Safety Community Service Award form (*attached*)

3. Form Submission

- A. Service Organization is responsible for submitting the form to your CGA Member Georgia 811.
- B. CGA Member is responsible for completing the form ordering materials, and submitting to CGA.

4. Awarding the 811 Youth Community Service Safety Award to the service organization

- A. Take pictures
- B. Share with Georgia 811 who will then forward to CGA on your behalf
- C. Contact local newspapers, radio and TV stations
- D. Company news letters
- E. Find opportunities to meet with the youth group in a larger setting.
- F. Don't lose the excitement – get the patches to the youth right away. Present ribbons at a larger setting. Give Service Award Marker at the end of the project.
- G. Shine in the Spot Light



811 Youth Community Service Safety Award

Common Ground Alliance (CGA) would like to recognize young adults from organizations such as Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, 4-H, FFA, etc. for considering safe digging practices when they conduct a community service project that involves any type of digging. Large or small projects are welcome.

A call must be placed to 811 before every digging project, from simple landscaping projects like planting trees or shrubs, to building a deck or installing a rural mailbox. Every eight minutes an underground utility line is damaged because someone decided to dig without first calling 811. Don't become part of the statistic – make sure to call 811!

Here's how it works:

- One free, simple phone call to 811 makes it easy for [Local one call center] to notify all appropriate utility companies of your intent to dig.
- Call at least 2 business days prior to digging to ensure enough time for utility lines to be properly marked.
- When you call 811, a representative from Georgia 811 will ask for the location and description of your digging project.
- Georgia 811 will notify affected utility companies, who will then send a professional locator to the proposed dig site to mark the approximate location of your lines.
- Once lines have been properly marked, roll up those sleeves and carefully dig around the marked areas. Remember to dig around the marks, not on them, and also remember that time, erosion or root structure growth can shift the locations of utility lines.

Striking a utility line while digging can lead to injury, penalties, repair costs, and inconvenient outages, so consider this is a friendly reminder to call 811 before you dig.

The 811 Youth Community Service Safety Award can be earned by completing the attached form and sub-submitting the completed application to your local CGA Member, Megan Estes. She may be contacted at mestes@georgia811.com or at 770-823-3936.

The 811 Youth Community Service Safety Award recognizes the importance of always calling 811 before projects that require digging to help prevent damage to underground utility lines

CGA is the national association dedicated to protecting underground utilities and the people who dig near them. Georgia 811 is one of the 1,500 members that comprise CGA.

Georgia residents who plan to dig, whether it's for a simple project such as planting a garden or a larger construction project, are required by law to call 811 at least two business days before digging to notify the underground utility owners that are members of Georgia 811 of their intent to dig. Georgia 811's member Companies will then send a company representative to the dig site to locate and mark the approximate location of underground utility lines with paint or flags. Once a site has been accurately located and marked, it is safe to dig carefully around the marked areas.

Knowing where underground utility lines are buried before digging helps people protect themselves from injury and prevents damages to utilities, service disruptions and potential fines, as well as expensive repair costs.

"The goal of the 811 Youth Community Service Safety Award is to distinguish dedicated young men and women for their diligence in safely completing community projects by digging safely," said Claudette Campbell, President and CEO for Georgia 811. "Whether you are a volunteer, a homeowner or a professional, it's critical to always know what's below by making the free call to 811 before digging. Doing so keeps our community safe and connected."

811 Youth Community Service Safety Award Descriptions



Service Patch

A Service Patch will be presented to each participant who completes the requirements of the underground safety program: "Call Before You Dig"



Ground Marker

A Ground Marker will be placed at the location of the organization excavation project. The Ground Marker should be approved by the Property Owner and placed at the project location to recognize the organization commitment to underground safety.



Award Ribbon

An Award Ribbon will be presented to the organization for a project, involving excavation activity, that completed the requirements of the underground safety program "Call Before You Dig".
